Part A—Hank Carde Award for Metropolitan Services



Jeff Natter's professional career in HIV/AIDS started in New York City, in 1984. He has been the Seattle-King County Part A Program Manager since 1995.

Mr. Natter helped engineer multiple "firsts" for Seattle-King County. He developed the Transitional Grant Area's (TGA's) first comprehensive needs assessment process in 1995—a model for other Part A and B grantees across the nation for directing services to consumers with the greatest needs. Mr. Natter also helped develop Seattle's first evaluation requirement for funded contractors in 1997 and helped agencies develop evaluation strategies and plans to measure and report Ryan White service outcomes. Seattle TGA is the first grantee to fully integrate the CLAS (Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services) Standards into all contracts.

Within Washington State, Mr. Natter helped found the Washington State Cross-Parts Collaboration Work Group, which works to refine pooled funding parity strategies, unmet need estimates, quality management processes, and statewide case management standards. Nationally, he has provided insight to policy issues such as Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS, assessment of unmet need, and Ryan White reauthorization.
